Checklist for GGS Essay


- 1. Essay typed on 8.5 x 11-inch paper
- 2. Margins of 1 inch (top and bottom) 1 inch on the sides (if you do not make any changes to the document when you create it, these will be the margins).
- 3. Essay is double-spaced.
- 4. The font is **Times New Roman.**
- 5. The font size is 12.
- 6. The heading is on the left side of the top of the page and includes this information: Name, Date, Class Period
- 7. The essay has a title that is centered at the top of the page.
- 8. The Thesis is one single sentence that is worded correctly and is the very last sentence of the introduction paragraph.
- 9. There are 3 body paragraphs that each contain two pieces of evidence (only one direct quote per paragraph) and correct MLA citations.
- 10. Each quote or paraphrase is followed by two sentences of analysis that help to relate the evidence back to the thesis and the prompt.
- 11. Each body paragraph begins with a topic sentence that introduces the topic and ends with a conclusion sentence that wraps up the topic.
- 12. The last page is a correctly completed Works Cited page (Double spaced, alphabetical, second line of each reference is indented)

Introduction Paragraph Structure the writing goes from General to Specific

- 1. Begins with a hook
- 2. Introduces the context and general topic
- 3. Provides background information, definitions, or any other information to introduce the reader to the thesis
- 4. Presents the writer's position on the topic (thesis)

In a conclusion paragraph, the writing goes from specific to general

- 1. Restate your thesis in a different way
- 2. Include the main ideas or the most important parts of your arguments (often these can be similar to your body paragraph conclusion sentences)
- 3. End the paragraph with the "so what" and relate your thesis to the bigger picture



TOPIC SENTENCE GUIDELINES

Write an essay outline

- An outline will help you understand what your topic sentences should be
- This can be an informal outline to help you organize your ideas
- Think about what goals each paragraph will achieve

State your topic sentence clearly

to address the main idea of your paragraph

- Do: clearly state where the paragraph is going
- Do: make sure to include your topic and opinion
- Don't: simply announce your topic - always add the direction of the paragraph

Use the topic sentence as a transition

to help you guide your readers

- Think of it as a bridge between the previous paragraph and the next
- Do: use transitional elements
- Make sure to keep your readers from getting lost

Give a reasonable opinion

- Your topic sentence should present something you can prove with evidence
- You can include an opinion, but only if you can back it up
- Don't: present only facts if you include a fact, also include your own input

Don't include info you won't explain later

- If you include in topic sentence, include in the paragraph
- Don't: fill up topic sentence with filler you won't explain further

Don't list off information

- Don't: make a list of what you're going to talk about in the paragraph
- Don't: explain everything in your topic sentence

Understand the connection between theses and topic sentences

- Thesis statements are the main goal or argument of your essay
- Topic sentences help support that goal or argument
- Topic sentences don't have to present an argument
 they can be explanatory
